Autumn

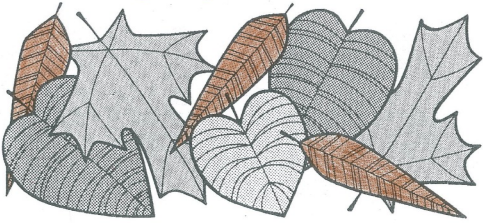
In the autumn day

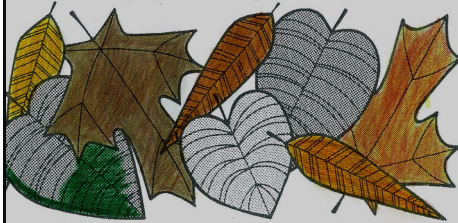
### Seasonal Haiku

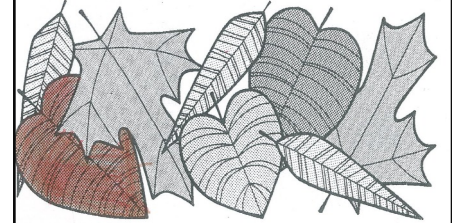

Autum

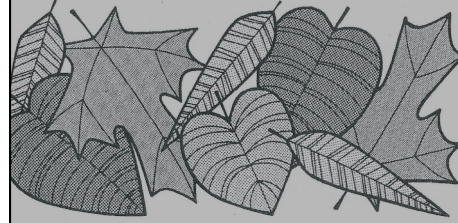
Autum comes quickly.
