


NUNDLE PUBLIC SCHOOL

Opportunities to work in a variety of group situations to support each other, while providing flexible learning and working options are also invaluable in developing habits of self-regulated learnings.

All of our students collectively agreed to Take a Stand Against Bullying by calling it out, and being active bystanders. 

Permission Notes

Throughout the year, and particularly at the start of each term, a number of permission notes are sent home. It is extremely important these are returned in a timely manner by the listed due date. Re-

turned notes allows office and teacher's time to fully organise and cater for events. Continually chasing up unreturned notes, takes valuable time away from the other important jobs that go on



behind the scenes. Un-returned notes may result in those students being unable to participate in school events.

We acknowledge that there are many notes sent home and it can be hard to keep a track of what's due which is one of the reasons we have started using the SchoolStream app. The majority of the permission notes are available through the app and they will also be sent home in paper format with the students and we encourage parents to remind students to check their bags each day. Should you need a copy please ring the office and we can arrange for an additional one to be sent home.

ACTIVE KIDS VOUCHER

The NSW Government is helping kids get active with the new Active Kids program.

Parents, guardians and carers can apply for a voucher valued up to \$100 per calendar year for each student enrolled in school.

The voucher may be used with a registered activity provider for registration, participation and membership costs for sport, fitness and active recreation activities.

The voucher can be used at any time during the calendar year it was issued.

To use the voucher, find a registered activity provider and present your voucher when you sign up.

WHAT IS THE IMAGINATION LIBRARY?

A free, monthly home delivered book program bringing the magic of a library into the home, with a gift of a book every month before school begins. Every child in the program is given real, physical books to keep, and kick start a lifelong love of reading.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO JOIN?

All babies born in 2019 currently living in Tamworth LGA are eligible to access the program.

DO I HAVE TO PAY?

No, thanks to Tamworth Council and Tamworth Regional Libraries, United Way Australia and various sponsors the Imagination Library is FREE.

HOW DO I SIGN MY CHILD UP?

Simply complete this form and return it to your local library with your baby's Blue Book to verify their date of birth. You can register for a library card at the same time. If you move home your book will continue to arrive if you have a redirection in place, until you contact us to update it.

WHEN WILL I RECEIVE MY FIRST BOOK?

You will receive a free book upon registration. Your next book will arrive in the mail 6-8 weeks later due to the ordering, packaging, and postage required for the national program.

WHAT DO I DO AFTER SIGN UP?

Enjoy reading with your child every day, and have fun using the monthly reading resources that come with each book as well as exploring your local library.
